



Main Street Revitalization

September 2014





Project Description

In December 2013, the Union Gap City Council hosted a kick-off meeting and visioning workshop to begin the planning process to revitalize Main Street. The Main Street study area consists of approximately 1.5 miles from just South of Valley Mall Boulevard to Interstate 82. During the kick-off meeting, participants were asked to volunteer to sit on a Task Force to guide development of the planning process. Comprised of business owners, city leaders, and residents, the Task Force convened several times to develop a design concept and provide a recommendation to City Council. In addition to the Task Force, the City Council participated in Main Street briefings and held a public forum to solicit community wide input.



THE BIG IDEA

Vision

Maintain a small town feel that integrates the city's value as an asset in the region. Create a pedestrian friendly, walkable, accessible and safe corridor with space for community events. Celebrate the historic character of Spring Creek Homestead, Pioneer Graveyard, and the Railroad.

Geometry

- Revise the traffic lanes to provide one lane in each direction with a center turn lane throughout the corridor
- Eliminate on-street parallel parking
- Provide bus pull out locations for Transit Service
- Provide wider sidewalks


Streetscape Components

- Identify the Civic Core as the hub of the corridor with enhanced lighting, site furnishings, street trees, art and/or special paving materials
- Provide pedestrian and street level light fixtures that reflect the design of the historic railroad
- Select site furnishings that are durable, vandal resistant, and easy to maintain
- Incorporate elements from the Cemetery in the site furnishings and lighting, such as the wrought iron ornamentation
- Include Complete Street components such as bike racks, energy efficient lighting, spaces for social/cultural events, enhance areas for transit riders, wider sidewalks and pedestrian furnishings
- Integrate different types of street trees to provide a variety of seasonal color and increased species diversity
